From Our Co-Senior Pastors: Their Sabbatical


It's hard to believe it's been almost seven years since Pastor Lara and I arrived in Salisbury. Since that new beginning, much has changed. When we arrived, we had one dog and no kids. Seven years later, our beloved dog, Red, is no longer with us, but God has given us the gift of two hilarious, wild, silly, and beautiful girls, Joanna and Phoebe. They've grown up before your eyes just as much as before ours. The church has changed, too. There are new faces on Sunday mornings, new staff members, and we've said goodbye to several faithful saints. The church went through a global health crisis that threatened something we cherish—community. Even so, we arrive at our seventh year feeling that God's Spirit continues to work in our midst.

The Bible loves the number seven. The seventh day was imbued with something special by our creator. It is the only day blessed and declared "holy"— set apart. It is the only day that receives continued attention throughout the biblical witness. On the seventh day, God rested. The number seven means wholeness, means rest, means a pause, means blessing. This is why the Scriptural witness expands the meaning of seven in its mention of Sabbatical. Sabbatical is a "Sabbath of Sabbaths," which occurs every seven years. In that year, farmers let their ground lie fallow with the implication that the ground and the workers are both given a period of rest and renewal. It is from this Scripture that denominations like our own have adopted Sabbaticals for their pastoral staff.

This summer, from June 16 - September 8, Pastor Lara and I are taking Sabbatical together. It's time to let the soil of our ministry lie fallow so that we can rest and renew our spirits for the next seven years to come. It is time for you, the congregation, to find renewal in this season. It is a time for you to rediscover that this church can survive without us. I imagine many of you are thinking, "Okay, so you're going away for 3 months. But what are you doing with that time?" It's a good question. Pastor Lara and I would like to each share one of the pieces of our Sabbatical that we're most looking forward to.

Pastor Josh: Emotionally Healthy Spirituality

The piece of Sabbatical I'm most looking forward to is called "The Emotionally Healthy Spirituality Course." A pastor, writer, and church leader named Pete Scazzero has spent the better part of the last twenty years helping leaders figure out how our being with God is connected to our doing for God. Wonders Scazzero, "How does our emotional and interior life affect our leadership?"



Believe it or not, this is a question I spend a lot of time thinking about. How does a pastor deal with carrying the grief and wounds they hear from parishioners on a weekly basis? How does a pastor lead with grace and yet also learn to have difficult conversations with staff or congregants? How does a pastor deal with conflict that happens in the context of ministry? As Scazzero says in his podcast, "There's the skills and aptitudes we bring to leadership, and then there's the person we are that we bring as well." For Scazzero, leadership is more than just acquired skills that can be applied in certain situations. Leadership is how one stays non-anxious and centered amid institutional challenges. Leadership is coming to terms with who one is, where one has been, so that the leader can bring who they truly are to their ministry.

The Emotionally Healthy Spirituality course is an 8-week course that involves scripture, prayer, psychological insights, devotions, and teaching. For me, Sabbatical is a perfect moment to go deeper. Sabbatical is a sabbath of sabbaths, a time to delight, to pause, and to contemplate the unique person God has uniquely called to this unique church. In other words, this course will help me continue down the path of becoming a healthier leader, person, and pastor. I'm excited to see what God will do during this course! Ask me about it when I get back. Hopefully, there will be much fruit to share.

Pastor Lara: Being Churchy

Growing up, I was the churchy girl. Obnoxiously churchy.

Sabbatical

I discovered my call to ministry as a churchy kid who was <u>refresh</u> <u>rest</u> <u>refocus</u> delighted by the sacred rhythms of worship, who encountered Christ in simple service, and had space for the unplanned interruptions of grace. During my Sabbatical, I want to reconnect with that churchy girl. In other words, I want to embrace the joys of discipleship outside of being a pastor in charge. As such, I'm most excited about attending worship, volunteering when I can, reading, and having space for holy interruptions.

I am soooooo excited to attend worship as a parishioner, not a pastor. I hope to worship at my childhood church in Illinois and a friend's PC(USA) church in Tacoma, WA. I love worshiping in different contexts, too. I hope to visit a wide range of churches: tiny and mega, white and black, English and Spanish, high church, low church, Presby, non-denom, AMEZ, Catholic, Pentecostal. I have 12 weeks to be another beggar in the pew, hungry for a meal of grace. I'll eat anything as long as Jesus is the main ingredient.



I also want to volunteer when I can. My soul needs a period of surrender of control and power. It will be good for me to show up and do what I'm told rather than be in charge. Plus, I discovered my calling through volunteer service. The least, last, lost, and lowly are Jesus in disguise, and I'd like to hang out with them or at least do a menial task to serve them.

Reading keeps my mind open and my heart soft. I can't wait to read a bunch this summer. I hope to read as much of the Bible as I can. I plan to read across a variety of disciples as the Spirit leads me.

Finally, I want to have lots of unplanned, empty time so that I needn't rush. The young-mom-pastorlife causes me to literally run from thing to thing more than I would like. I hope to recalibrate my sense of time from Chronos (get it done) time to Kairos (sacred slowness) time by wasting time with my kids, reading that extra chapter, lingering in conversation with a stranger, simply because I am remembering that God is the creator and master of all things, including time.

Who will be our pastors while you're gone?

Pastor Randy will serve as acting Head of Staff and moderator of Session. He will also have the support of two wonderful, retired clergy who have blessed First Pres by choosing to make First Pres their home—



Revs. Bill Hoyle and Felicia Stewart Hoyle. Bill and Felicia will preach, lead liturgy, and offer pastoral care to our congregation. In addition to Bill and Felicia, we will have several other guest preachers, including Tony de la Rosa, the Executive Presbyter of Salem Presbytery, Daniel Heath, the Director of the Davidson Forum and the LCW pianist, and more. These ministers will bless you with their wisdom, warmth, and care.

What if we see you around town?

If you see us around town, please say hi! We are going to miss seeing your faces each week. Truly. We're a little worried about it. So please say hello, but please do not tell us anything about the church—good, bad, or ugly. We both are anticipating having a difficult time letting go of the day-today at First Pres. Hearing even a peep about it could easily suck us back in and defeat the purpose of Sabbatical.

How can we follow you?

Check Pastor Lara's Facebook page for updates from both Pastor Josh and Pastor Lara. We'll post about once a week so that you can get a snapshot of where we are, what we're up to, and what God is doing in us. When we return, we'll each lead a Sunday School lesson and write a newsletter article on our sabbaticals to share more with you.

We can't possibly thank you all enough for supporting this milestone in ministry. We trust that God will be faithful to us all in this season. We don't leave until June 16th. If you have any questions or concerns, come chat with us!


First Pres 2025 Concert Series Presents: Caroline Owen, Guest Musician

(1) The Choral Scholars Program, relaunched last August, has been an enormous success. We are incredibly thankful for the high school and college students who faithfully contribute to our music ministry. While some have had to leave due to school or

(2) The First Pres Concert Series began last summer with a delightful concert by pianist Elena Lyalina in July, followed by a chamber music concert featuring Eileen Young, Ryan Graebert, and myself in August. We also enjoyed performances by the Rowan Big Band in September and the Salisbury Swing Band in October. This year, we have some wonderful concerts already scheduled, and I'd like to highlight the three that are happening this summer:



May 18th, Sunday, at 4:00 pm

Join us for a concert featuring pianist Caroline Owen, followed by a reception. A native of Atlanta, Caroline frequently performs as a soloist and collaborator in venues across the United States, Canada, and Europe, including the DiMenna Center for Classical Music in New York and the Wiener Saal at the Mozarteum in Salzburg. Owen is a previous winner of the Florida MTNA Young Artist Competition and was a semifinalist in the 14th International Mozart Competition Salzburg and the International Keyboard Odyssiad. In 2018, she won the Pro-Mozart Society of Atlanta Competition, which provided her with a scholarship to study at the Salzburg Mozarteum. She has appeared as a soloist with the Furman University Symphony Orchestra and the Orlando Contemporary Chamber Orchestra. Her upcoming performances include a world premiere at the Midtown Arts & Theater Center Houston and multiple chamber music tours across Florida. You won't want to miss this concert!

We are honored to welcome The Elektra Winds, a woodwind quartet, to our First Pres Concert Series, celebrating 10 years as North Carolina's premier woodwind ensemble. Founded by professional musicians Dr. Laura Dangerfield Stevens (flute), Dr. Anna Lampidis (oboe), Dr. Eileen Young (clarinet), and Ms. Amber Ferenz (bassoon), the quartet's core members teach at several colleges and universities in the area, including Wake Forest University and UNC-Chapel Hill. Various members perform in regional orchestras, including the Greensboro, Winston-Salem, Salisbury, Western Piedmont, and Asheville symphonies. Elektra Winds specializes in 20th-century music and actively seeks to perform works by women composers, including Amber Ferenz. Their mission is to elevate the visibility of the woodwind quartet through professional performances and commissioned works.

TWAM: A Firm Foundation

Have you ever had that feeling of sheer satisfaction that comes from building something with your hands? Maybe it was a sandcastle on the beach with your kids, maybe it was a tree house in the backyard, maybe it was a raised garden bed in the side yard. I'm always amazed at the satisfaction and delight our young people have when they finish building homes on our Mexico Mission trip.

But this trip is more than just building physical homes. Providing shelter and generational wealth to an unhoused family is, of course, one of the main goals of the trip. However, I always push my students to turn the question toward their own lives. What, I ask them, is God building within you?

In 1 Corinthians, Paul uses the building of structures as a metaphor for what God does in us, the church. Christ, says Paul, is a firm foundation. If you're wondering what the building of that foundation looks like, come to worship on Sunday, June 15th. We'll have a unified worship service that day. You'll come and see a stage full of smiling, ebullient faces. There will be something sturdy, something lasting, in the words you hear these young people speak. Why? Because they have bore witness to the transformation of human lives, something they wrought with their very hands. It's funny how that works, right? Build something for someone else, and you'll find yourself built up. So, here's my two asks of this congregation:

1)Pray for our Mission team as we travel and as we serve the week of June 7-14.

2)Come Sunday, June 15, and see and hear what God has done.

As part of the Juneteenth Celebration at Bell Tower Green on June 21, the Race and Justice Ministry Team is partnering with Salisbury-Rowan NAACP and Livingstone College to provide trolley tours of the African American Heritage Trail in downtown Salisbury and at Livingstone **College.** These tours coincide in celebration of Juneteenth and the Emancipation **Proclamation, officially titled Proclamation** 95. а presidential proclamation and executive order issued by United States President Abraham Lincoln on January 1. 1863. Twenty-two disciples have already committed just shy of \$2,500,000 toward insuring that the Legacy of First Presbyterian Church endures for another 200 years.



Rise Up Rowan: Pilot Program Reaches Out to Young Learners

Letters, numbers, colors, and shapes are the simplest of concepts. Yet, hundreds of local children start kindergarten each year not knowing these basics. With the help of First Presbyterian and other churches, a group called Rise Up Rowan is working to improve local kindergarten readiness and create better possibilities for Salisbury children. Rise Up Rowan grew out of a workshop that First Pres helped sponsor in January 2024, organized by Racial Equity Rowan. Our pastors and several Race Task Force members took part, as did leaders from about a dozen



area churches. The participants soon initiated a push for more widespread access to early childhood education. Additional individuals, churches, and organizations have joined Rise's drive to give 3 and 4-year-olds of all races an equal opportunity to learn. Recently, in Rowan County, only 22 percent of entering students were kindergarten-ready in literacy skills. Rise believes we can and must give children a better start.

Leading the effort from our church are Debbie Collins, Pastor Lara, and Beffie Cook, along with Monica Green of Trinity Presbyterian and the Rev. Ethel Bamberg-Revis of Soldiers Memorial AME Zion Church. Several more First Pres members are involved, and everyone's input is welcome.

Working with Greg Alcorn's ApSeed program and a generous ApSeed grant, volunteers are conducting a pilot project at Zion Hills Apartments off Brenner Avenue. Ten families have agreed to let their children take part in weekly on-site tutoring that includes books, games, activities, and ApSeed's Seedling touchpads. The touchpads introduce children to letters, numbers, colors, and shapes. Celia Jarrett and Kathy Roberson from St. John's Lutheran Church and Shirley Holt and Dorothy Gill-Smith from Moore's Chapel AME Zion Church have been instrumental in the pilot. The program has opened the door to help families identify other needs and find resources. Each child goes home with a Food for Thought bag. If all goes well, Rise will launch more tutoring sites, possibly at the Brookview Apartments on MLK Avenue and the Lafayette Street Apartments. More than 30 churches have supported and encouraged Rise's work.

Rise Up Rowan is taking an advocacy role as well. Childcare is in a state of crisis in North Carolina due to teacher shortages, low wages and high costs. Parents who can't afford to send their children to a licensed program often stay out of the workforce. A report released last summer estimates that insufficient childcare availability costs the state \$5.65 billion in lost economic activity each year.

Rise Up Rowan members have met with N.C. Rep. Harry Warren and Sen. Carl Ford to talk about the issue. The NC Chamber of Commerce Foundation is focused on finding childcare solutions. Rise also wants to raise awareness about the importance of early learning. The majority of human brain development occurs in the first three years of life. There's not a moment to lose in nurturing young learners.
