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## **The Weirdest Book of the Bible: Reading Esther in Uncertain Times**

Depending on who you ask and what mood they are in, the book of Esther has been called historical fiction, revenge fantasy, political comedy, or diasporic saga. It manages to be horrifying, hopeful, and humorous at the same time. To read this ancient and enigmatic narrative without wondering why it's in the Bible at all is impossible. And still, the contemporary resonance of the Esther story is unmistakable: state power bears down to settle personal scores; non-native residents are acutely vulnerable; God is silent throughout--hiding among coincidences, (or not?). The weirdest book of the Bible is a noisy, rambunctious response to all our prayers for God's will to be done on earth, as it is in heaven.

# *What is the Season of Advent?*

Presents under the Christmas tree are so exciting. Pastor Josh is notorious in his family for shaking presents in an attempt to spoil the surprise of what is coming. A book that will change our minds? A toy that will change the way we play? A tool that will change the way we work?

In Advent, we wait for something coming. First, we reenact the long wait of the people of Israel 2000+ years ago for their messiah. These were a people under violent captivity who longed for God to loose their binds and set them free. They needed not a charismatic leader to lead an uprising as they thought, they needed someone from outside, not their nation, but the created world—they needed God. Wrapped in swaddling clothes in the arms of a poor, insignificant young woman, that's exactly what they got. Only God could conquer the true enemies of sin and death to free them from bondage. Jesus was their long-awaited Christmas gift who came to change the way we live and love.

This Advent, we wait for something coming still. We wait for a future that will again come from the outside. It will not unfold from the already formed bud of the present. Instead, it will come with Jesus reigning in glory, coming to bring a new future so hopeful, universal, so healing and whole, that it's immeasurably far more than we could ask for or grasp. It is for this good future in the coming of Christ that we wait now.

The good news is, just as the people of Israel did nothing but wait for Christ 2000 years ago, the only thing you **HAVE** to do this Advent, in a true and ultimate sense, is wait for God. Wait and see what God will do with your sorrow, your sin, your grief, your captivity, your hope. In the coming of God, all things will be made new.

Advent is the right time to think about newness. In this newsletter, you will find newness arriving as a present under the tree from God. You'll learn about our plans to celebrate Dr. Kirby's retirement. After almost 25 years of faithful ministry, Pastor Randy is beginning a new chapter in retirement. We give thanks to God for all that Randy has done and meant to this congregation. Also in this newsletter, you'll see a new plan for staffing at the church in the new year. Hint: Prepare to meet a new pastor.

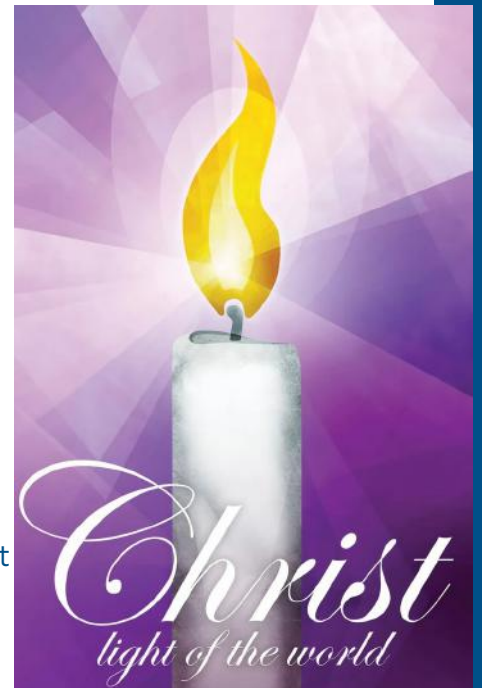

# *The Longest Night - A Service of Advent Reflection*

The holidays are upon us. By the time you read this, you may be recovering from the Thanksgiving stuffing and getting ready for the Christmas celebrations. Most years, the holidays are a time for gathering with friends, singing joyful songs, and enjoying your favorite holiday foods. It is the season of celebration!

However, for some of us, the songs of celebration simply intensify the difficulties of the year. Perhaps a loved one died, and this is the first holiday without them. Or maybe there was an unexpected diagnosis that has left the future uncertain. For some, it is simply the daily news of war and disaster. If you can relate to any of these feelings, I invite you to attend the "Longest Night: A Service of Advent Reflection" on Sunday, December 21, at 7:00 pm, in Lewis Hall.

During the last few years, the Longest Night has become a special part of our Advent Services. It is a service of prayers, special music, and reflection. Participants are invited to a time of prayer for their needs and for the world. You will also have the opportunity to light a candle for those individuals and concerns on your heart in this year's season.

The liturgy we follow describes the longest night this way: "For those who have experienced loss, the holidays can be a particularly painful time, stirring up grief in acute ways. As a result, churches around the world have adopted the practice of having a "Blue Christmas" or a "Longest Night" service during the Advent season. In the Northern hemisphere, this service is often observed on or around the Winter Solstice, which is the longest night of the year."

"A Longest Night service is designed to provide space for prayer, reflection, and remembrance amidst the holiday hustle and bustle... We hope that this service of worship can be a gift to individuals and communities, providing a space of calm, quiet, and healing" (adapted from "The Longest Night," a Liturgy by Rev. Sarah Speed | A Sanctified Art LLC | [sanctifiedart.org](http://sanctifiedart.org))."

As our congregation prepares for his retirement and departure, many of you will be wondering, "What comes next?" In recognition that no one person can simply replace someone who has meant so much to our congregation, our Session, in collaboration with several ministry teams, has created a new staffing plan for after Randy's retirement.

First, I, Pastor Lara, will be taking on Pastoral Care. I am eager to spend more time with you in your homes, hospital rooms, and care facilities. I want to bear witness to Christ's presence in your joys and sorrows. I want to grasp your hand and seek God together in prayer. I have already shifted from working part-time to full-time in order to take on this role.

Second, we are searching for an Associate Pastor for Formation and Mission. The new pastor will not be "Randy's replacement." He or she will be the person God has hand-picked to love and serve this congregation in the areas of Christian Formation and Mission. They will collaborate with Grow in Fatih, Gather, Community Ministries, and Showing Up Ministry Teams. They will bring new gifts in preaching, worship leadership, and care. The Associate Pastor Nominating Committee (APNC) has been hard at work searching for this new Pastor.

## *Providing Shelter*

Part of our tradition as Presbyterians is a statement that enumerates the six Great Ends of the Church. These Great Ends guide the church, reminding us of what we believe we should be doing if we really want to be the body of Christ in the world. It will come as no surprise that the first End is “the proclamation of the gospel for the salvation of humankind.” Every Sunday, and a thousand ways in between, we proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ for the sake of a world in need of saving in a thousand different ways.

The second one, you may not have guessed. The second End is “the shelter, nurture, and spiritual fellowship of the children of God.” Even when said like that, shelter seems so obvious that we tend to slide right over it. Yet it seems appropriate for the disciples of a savior for whom there was no room when he was to be born. Our Facilitate Team takes its task seriously. Providing shelter for the children of God is a noble task that requires expertise, energy, and imagination. At First Pres, we are blessed with property that has been built and cared for by generations. We are fortunate to have it to use and to offer it to the children of God in our community who need shelter.

In recent years, we have been looking for more ways that we can offer shelter to groups, both in the church and in the community, that fit our mission of nurture and fellowship. We host dinners for our mission partners from time to time. We welcome groups from the Rowan-Salisbury School System on a regular basis. In November, we are hosting a Thanksgiving dinner for International Teachers. In December, we will once again host the Christmas dinner and coat giveaway sponsored by the 3-WIDE Foundation.

Since before the pandemic, we have hosted Kids at Work weekly, a culinary program for at-risk teens provided by Aspire Youth and Family Inc. In the last couple of years, our Showing Up Team has been hosting Red Cross Blood Drives. Over seven drives, we have collected 227 units of blood.

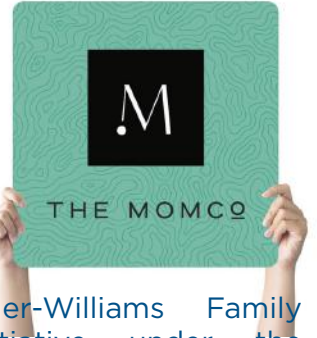


Embracing the Unchurched has been hosting MomCo on Mondays twice a month for two years. This is a small group ministry designed to support mothers of young children.

This fall, we have begun hosting weekly rehearsals for the Rowan Choral Society. Beginning in November, we will provide space for a Girl Scout Troop twice a month.

We also recently hosted once again the Messinger-Williams Family Community Education Initiative under the leadership of Hood Theological Seminary.

And I am sure that I have overlooked others. The point is that we are attempting to fulfill our calling to “Shelter” the children of God. Let the Showing Up Team know if you want to help or need more information about what is going on. May God continue to bless us with shelter to share!

## *Raising The Young from the Dead*

It's been a lovely fall in youth ministry, to say the least. We've dived headlong into Scripture on Wednesday nights, served alongside one another, and gathered for hearing God's good news on Sunday mornings and evenings. It still amazes me that young people today drive their cars to church.

Lately, my thoughts have turned to a penetrating question, one that I placed before 18 PC-USA pastors at a recent conference in Roanoke, VA, "What kind of youth ministry only makes sense because Jesus was raised from the dead by the Spirit of the God of Israel?" It's a complicated and somewhat convoluted question. Even so, the question suggests that Youth ministry is something more than mere moral formation. Most people suppose that "what we do up there in that youth room" is all about telling kids to be better, and showing how to be better, and then they're better.

But good morals just won't raise Jesus from the dead. We live in a society that baptizes the self. We believe that the self, and not the soul, controls and wills us into happiness. Are you sad? Buy something. Are you in grief? Here are 5 ready-made lifehacks to suck you out of the sadness. In short, says theologian Andy Root, we believe that happiness is achievable, attainable, and accessible, if only we make it so through our actions in the world.

Social media algorithms exacerbate the issue. They're "self-machines," endlessly putting before us content that further entrenches what we already believe, and endlessly mirroring back to us who we think we are. And what's more, YouTube is the news source of choice for most young people these days. To that point, I recently heard of a YouTube page called "redeem

zoomer," a page curated by a young adult who is a member of the PC-USA. The page has 600,000 subscribers. As a part of the page, "redeem zoomer" rates various churches by his selected criteria, encouraging his followers to only attend churches with a "1." Youth ministry is not about "morals" because the gospel isn't about morals. The gospel is the good news that in Jesus's birth, life, death, resurrection, and ascension God has destroyed death, gut-punched sin, transfigured the universe, and has thus given us a new way to be human in the world. And just what microphone did God choose to communicate this ridiculous message? The church.

So, what's youth ministry about? In my 7 years of experience, my answer has changed. These days, my answer has to do with relationships. Because God meets us in the person of Jesus Christ, youth ministry is about how Jesus accompanies us as we meet young people, especially in their sadness and sorrow. Over the years, I have wondered just what is the secret sauce that is mixed into our annual TWAM Mission trip. Is it just that serving feels so good? Is it that the tacos are just that tasty? Is it that learning skills to build a home for the poor fills our souls? It is all those things. But more than all of that, what happens on these trips is that the God of death and resurrection encounters young people as they meet the death and resurrection of others. It's the kind of ministry that only makes sense because Jesus was raised from the dead.

I could go on, but I suppose what's left is to ask you, dear member of First Pres, how can you engage with this youth ministry? Well, the first and most important thing you can do is pray. Pray that God's life will interrupt, challenge, and comfort our young people. Pray that they might meet and seek discipleship's cost and find themselves coming back for more. The second thing you can do is volunteer. Has God laid on your heart the desire to mentor a young person? Have you ever asked? There's no such thing as too many youth leaders, and we invite you to join in with what God is up to, trusting that the Spirit of his Son will move within and around us.



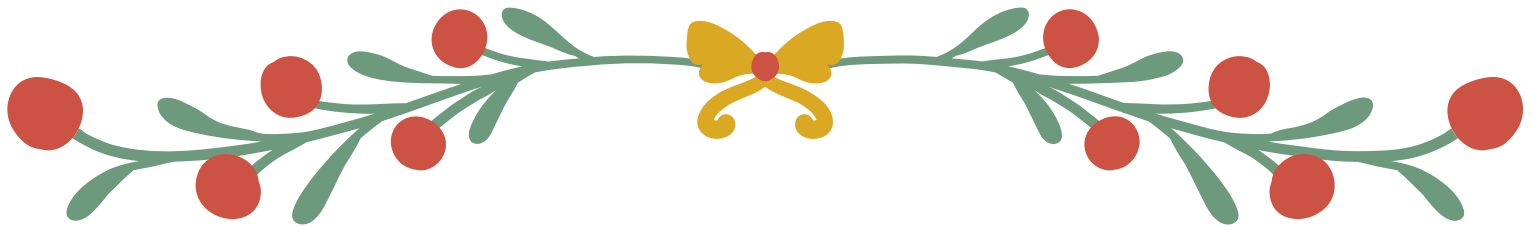

## Who is the Session of First Pres?

The Session is the church's governing body, which makes spiritual and operational decisions for the church between meetings of the Congregation. It is composed of twelve Elders who are elected annually, four at a time, for three-year terms. The Session elects a Clerk, who is the official record keeper but not an active member of the Session, to maintain the records of the Session. Any member may submit another member for Elder nomination consideration.

Each Elder works with one or more of our Mission Teams to ensure that all our members are spiritually supported and cared for. The Elders are also responsible for the care and upkeep of the First Pres facilities and the employment of staff to assist with program implementation.

The Session meets monthly, except for July. The Ordained Pastors are the Moderators of the meeting and establish its agenda. Any member may ask to present on the agenda by contacting the Moderator or the Clerk.

When you observe the parking lot's recent pavement project, it came through the Facilities Team to the Session for approval and implementation. When you participated in submitting your annual pledge, that came through the Fund Team to the Session for approval and implementation. When you participated in First Kids or Sunday School, that came through the Grow in Faith Team to the Session for approval and implementation.

As Presbyterians, we use a representative form of operation, and the Session is our decision-maker between meetings of the Congregation, who is the ultimate decision-maker for the church.
