From Pastor Lara

In Chicago's Millennium Park, there is a world-famous sculpture called the Cloud Gate. I grew up knowing it by its common name: the Bean. It looks like an alien dropped a soft silver-plated kidney bean out of the sky and into the hard vertical lines of the Chicago skyline. While it was designed to stretch the clouds over its 60-foot-long top as if like a gate, it has become famous as a fantastic place to take selfies. I must have visited the Bean twice in its first year, and I still have the selfies to prove it. The Bean is compelling to modern audiences because it is smooth, edgeless, and reflective. It has no character of its own but instead amusingly distorts the reflections of its surroundings. It's neutral. It has no hard lines. It makes no claims of truth and demands nothing of those who encounter it.



The God of the Bible is nothing like the Bean. Jesus is not every man; he is the Son of Man. He was born in Bethlehem to Mary and Joseph. He was raised in a specific community, the people of Israel, with all their particular rituals, practices, and scriptures. They worship a unique God who gives very particular commands for how to live. He dies under Caiaphas, Herod, Pilate, and Caesar. The Bean-Gods of Babylon, Rome, and the far East do not care much for the details of mortals' lives, but dies for the details of our sins and impending death. Our God is particular.

This particular God was busy saving the world long before Jesus of Nazareth was born in a Galilean backwater barn. The story of our salvation starts in the Old Testament with people like Adam, Noah, Abraham, Hagar, Moses, Shipra, David, Tamar, and Ezekiel. During Lent, we will be exploring God's saving work through the life-and-death stories of Old Testament characters. Through the Word of God proclaimed, we will be encountered by this detailed and distinct God.

I've had this experience multiple times. You walk up to The Bean and discover that it doesn't feel like much. In art museums, you find portraits with unique faces. Eyes greet you with warmth or stare at you in judgment. Lips smile or sneer. Details tell the story of feast or famine, friends and foes. Most art is an encounter with a peculiar stranger that can make you feel confused, joyful, awed, humbled, afraid. Strangely, there is no feeling of encounter when you walk up to the Bean. It's cool. But it always left me feeling like I missed something. The encounter was elusive. The meaning wasn't empty, it was absent.

But walk into the stories of Scripture and be called and claimed by not just a particular God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, but by The God. Come have an encounter you couldn't possibly capture in a selfie, but that instead captures yourself in a grand story of life-and-death and salvation.

In our New Members Class, I often say, “Church is a group project. It doesn’t get done if everyone isn’t contributing.” But that’s a very surface version of what I want to say. I want to say this:

“Jesus did a very strange thing. Through his death, he destroyed the powers of sin and death. He went toe to toe with the powers and principalities of this world, and he won. He won! But he doesn’t stay to enjoy the spoils. He doesn’t stay to establish a new world order with him as the indisputable, indispensable leader. He ascends to Heaven and leaves his ongoing ministry to a group of fallen, imperfect, busy people.

God chose the church to be, literally, the body of Christ walking this earth. These days, the church gets a bad rap. It’s out of touch. Too focused on heaven to be any earthly good. Too focused on material realities to address the invisible secrets of the universe. Too old-fashioned. Too damaged by a sordid history to trust. And yet, the bride of Christ gave birth to the hospital and homeless shelter, values of rights and literacy, the Julian calendar, and modern science. From the outside, we look like an expendable accessory to individual lives. But if you study the history, the church—to be clear—local little faithful churches like ours—is the burning engine of creation of social benefit for our world.

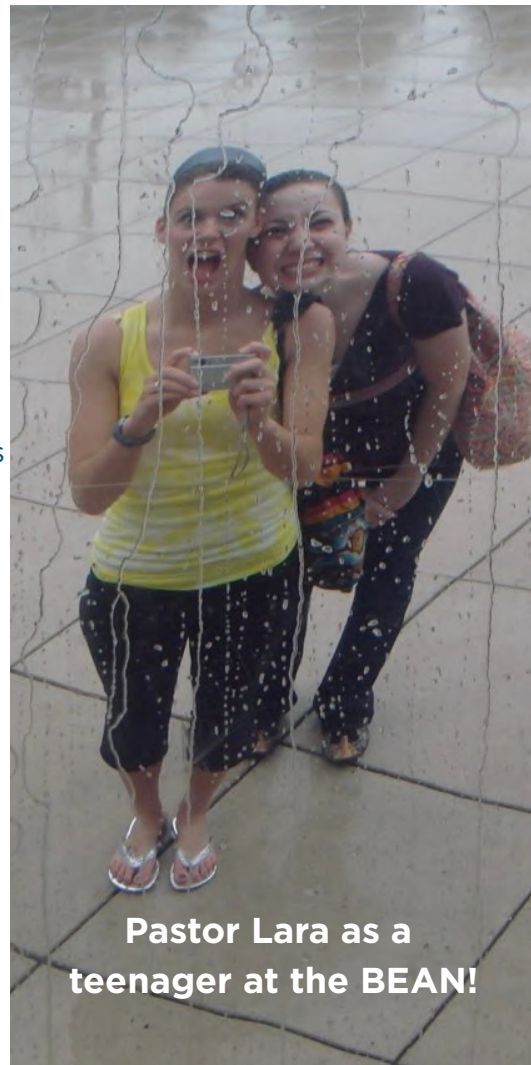
Not only does the church slowly transform our world over centuries, but it also transforms you. Involvement in God’s imperfect and beloved bride invites you deeper into faith and deeper into the heart of God. You serve as Christ’s hands and feet. The Spirit of comfort and wisdom pours forth into and through you. And you witness God’s provision for those you love. I honestly think there’s no party better than Sunday morning worship.

That’s what I want to say. But whether I give a surface-level or deep theological explanation, the bottom line remains the same. You have a ministry in this church. We, your siblings in Christ, need you. You are an indispensable part of this body. So come and volunteer!

If you’re already involved in 2 or more ministries, this is not for you. If you’re part of this church in any way, as an online worshiper, an occasional visitor, or family of a member, you still have a ministry. We are working on growing our volunteerism at the church. We have opportunities for everyone. There are ways you can serve during the week and on the weekend, during the day and in the evening, at the church and from your couch. Come, be God’s literal hands and feet in this world. Come be amazed by what God can do through you.

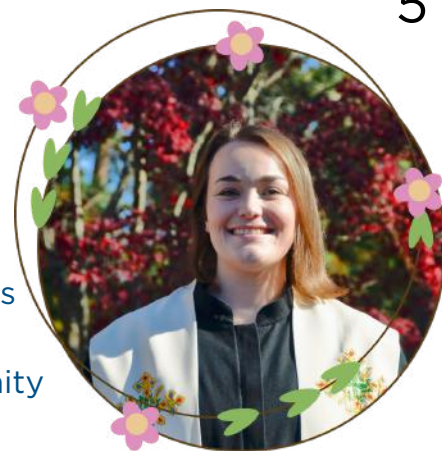

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God's Hope for Young Souls

January 1st means many things. Christmas decorations come down. The radio changes away from Bing Crosby and Pentatonix. Our houses are quieter—the relatives and friends have gone back to school, back to their homes.

January 1st means a New Year. It's 2026! For some of us, the new year presents a welcome opportunity. We begin our juice cleanses and diets to shave off all the cookies and pie. We make resolutions to become better people—we join the gym, we put down the bottle, we pick up the book, we turn off the television.

But underneath all the resolutions and self-made promises is one difficult reality—we are still who we were on December 31st. No matter how much we try to change ourselves, the wounds of this world cling to us like bugs to a spider web. I wonder if underneath it all, what we're really longing for is not to become better people, but to become relieved people.

What we long for more than change, more than new, is relief. Relief from what? (you ask in a defensive, angry tone). Well, relief from whatever you're feeling defensive and angry about. Relief from the ever-assaulting and amassing pressures of being alive—to be more, have more, know more.

No one knows pressure like the youth of today. There's the pressure we adults put on them from the outside. I would call these "performative pressures." The pressure to get not just good grades but the best grades. The pressure to not just enjoy sports but to be a world-class athlete. All of this is not to mention the torrid pressures of social media to have the best life, the most friends—it's a spinning comparison tornado from which there is no easy escape.

Our youth ministry at First Pres is an escape from pressure. It's meant to, in a small way, be a place to experience the relief the gospel offers weary souls. It is a place where we hope in the promised future God has for young people.

Every once in a while, you come across a book that really digs into you. One of the books that got a hold of me in the last few years was Richard Reeves' "Of Boys and Men." The book asks a simple yet penetrating question: "How are men in the United States doing?" The answer was not surprising to me. In short, men aren't doing well...for a host of reasons. Men are less religious, have fewer friends, are more likely to die deaths of despair (suicide, overdose, alcoholism), are more likely to be incarcerated, and are far less educated than women, and all this at increasingly alarming rates. Men are also less likely than ever to become teachers, which means outside of fathers and coaches, young men are being mentored less and less by other men. Men in their 30's and 40's look back fondly at the childhood friendships of their youth. The days of fake swords, plastic Nerf guns, endless fort-building escapades, and yet as they grow older wonder where all their friends have gone.

To top it all off, we live in a culture where men are expected to be either stoic or violent, and at times, are even made fun of for being vulnerable about their struggles. They say, real men don't cry. They say, pain is just weakness leaving the body. But the state of manhood is revealing that these old adages just don't work anymore.

How can we celebrate and advocate for the flourishing of women while equally desiring the well-being of men? That's the question that's been gnawing at me these last few years. If you've heard anything about our flourishing spirit-led MomCo ministry, you know that we are providing a place for women to be women together. I wonder, how can we do more of this for men? To put this all more personally, how do I, as a Christian, be a good and kind father, spouse, colleague, and friend?

The political landscape these days offers little help, and as usual, provides only ill-fitting stereotypes and polarizing comparisons. On the far right, we're given visions of masculinity that feel, frankly, excessively anti-woman, and unrealistically "manly" in ways that just don't fit all kinds of men out there. And yet on the far left, we're given no vision of what a man is at all. Some young men have even expressed to me that they feel the far left has shamed them for being men altogether.

So what does this have to do with the church? Well, we can't solve all of these issues at once. But what we can do, what we must do, is offer a place where men can gather together. We've already got one of those in our lovely Everyman's Bible class. And so I feel it's time to offer yet another place for men to gather.

Starting Tuesday, March 3, I invite men of all ages to gather together at 6:30am for Men's Group Bible study at First Pres. What will we do? Well, it's quite simple. We will drink coffee, eat donuts, tell jokes, read the Scriptures, share life, and pray for one another. My earnest hope for this Bible Study is that it will be a place for men of different generations to find brothers in Christ who will encourage them in the life of faith. Frankly, I know that this is something I need, and I'm betting that other men feel the same.

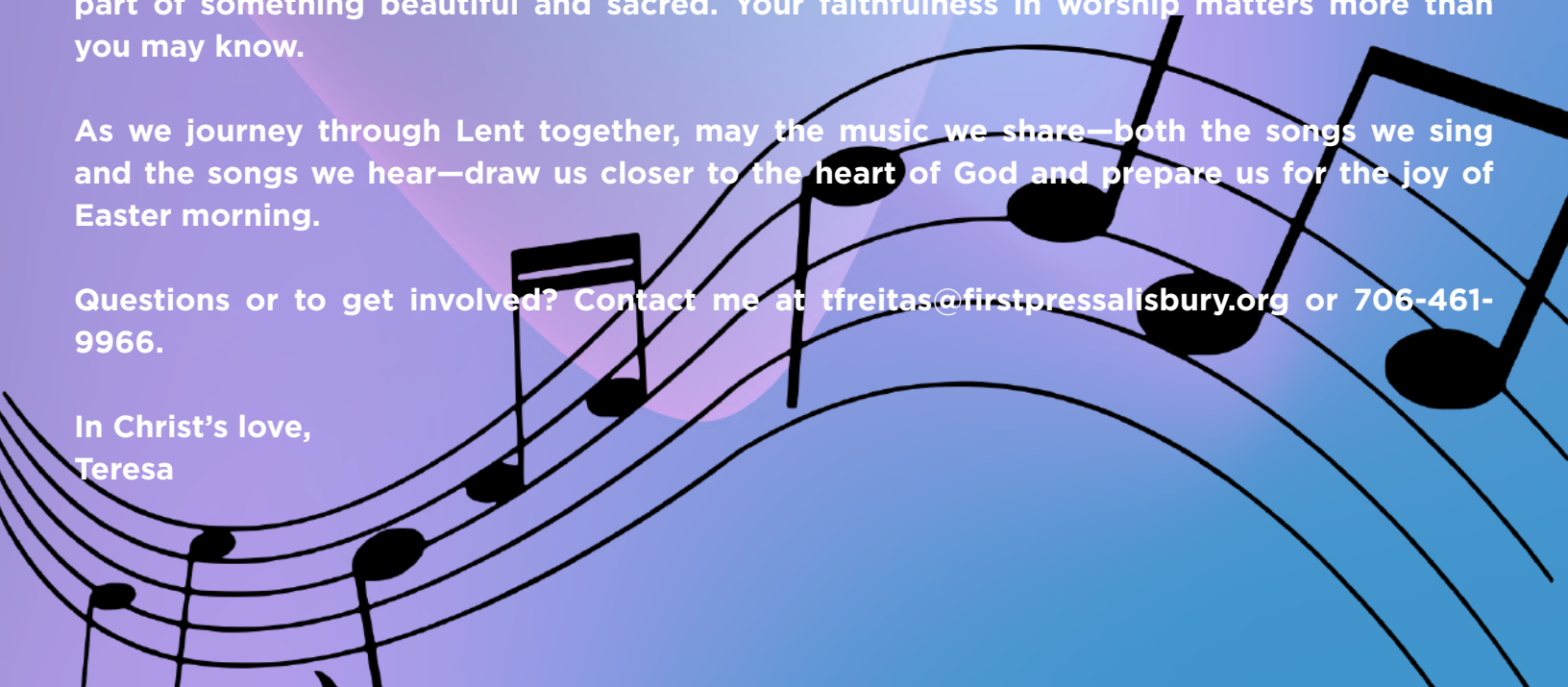
A Word of Gratitude

Maundy comes from the Latin “Mandatum,” meaning “commandment.” Holy Thursday is “commandment Thursday.” We remember the “new commandment” to love one another as Christ loved his disciples that dark evening. And how did he love them? Well, by doing something no one in their right mind would ever do—he washed their feet.

The Maundy Thursday service at First Pres is, one of the richest, most powerful, most beautiful, and moving services of the entire year. 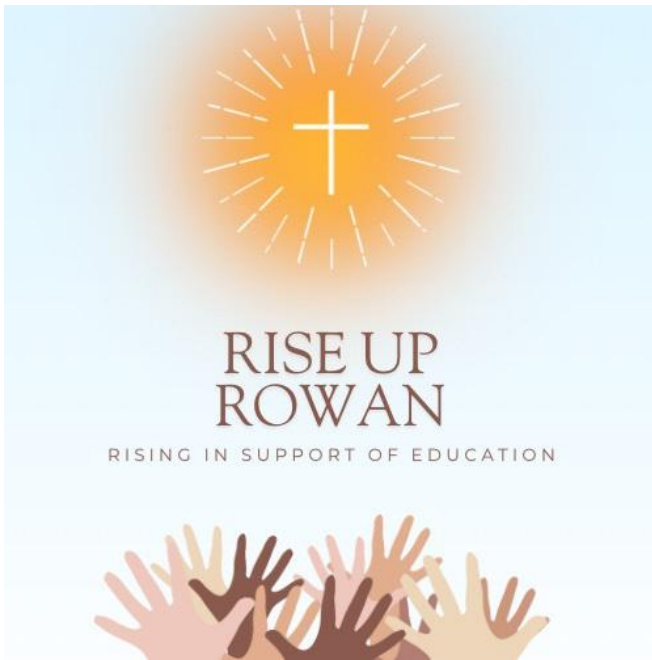

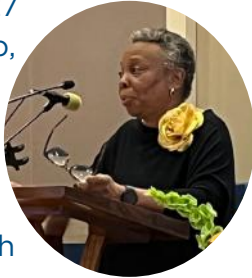

SALEM PRESBYTERY

Presbyterian  Church (USA)

The Fall Gathering of Salem Presbytery's Presbyterian Women drew 80 women together in Salisbury on Sept. 27 for music, inspiration, fellowship, and prayer. Moderator Monica Green welcomed the crowd to the meeting at First Pres Salisbury. A member of the Jubilee Choir, she also sang with the group during the program.



Catreliia Hunter introduced the speaker, the Rev. Dr. Rashell Hunter, author of the 2025-26 PW/Horizons Bible Study. Dr. Hunter brought scripture alive as she talked about the bent woman in Luke 13. Crippled by a disabling spirit for 18 years, the woman could not fully straighten herself. She looked only at the ground. The speaker said many women today have ground-facing eyes, loaded down with weariness, relationship issues, greed, injuries, loneliness, guilt, failure, death, racism, sexism, and toxic politics. "Many of you are bent over, but don't despair," she said. "The word of God is for you today." In the scripture, Jesus laid hands on the woman, and she stood straight. "I like to believe she did a happy dance," Rev. Hunter said. Church leaders criticized Jesus for healing on the Sabbath, which showed they were no leaders at all. "A real leader has a compassionate and healing spirit," Dr. Hunter said. "Real church leaders would not let a sister be bent to the ground without lifting her up. They engage in ministry with the least and the lost." She said Jesus set the woman free, as he has done for women of faith through the ages. "We have been propelled forward on the breathe of bent-over



women, daughters of Abraham, theirs according to the promise. Though once bent over, they saw Jesus and stood tall."

Hunter, who teaches at Louisville Seminary, said she wrote the Bible study book, "Finding Resilience, Joy, and Our Identity in Jesus Christ," because it fits the time we live in. "It is hard not to be consumed by chaos," she said, but we need to reconnect with our spiritual and devotional lives. "There's a path that offers healing and the ability to spring back into shape."
