A New Fall Sermon Series on the Sermon on the Mount

What would Jesus do?:

If the gospel were a recipe, what would be its ingredients? Ask 100 people, and you might get 100 different answers. Surely many would say words like love, joy, hope, and grace, but what kind of love are we talking about, and where does that joy come from, and in whom is that hope rooted, and how far does that grace extend?

The answers to this question come to us from a mountaintop. Early in Matthew's gospel, Jesus gathers his disciples and teaches them, amidst the crowds, the recipe for following Jesus. He'll say some things we'll find easy to follow. Love your neighbor, blessed are those who mourn, you're the light of the world. We know what shelf those ingredients are on.

But then he'll say some things that make this recipe much more difficult to follow. Love your enemies. Pray for those who persecute you. Be perfect as your heavenly father is perfect. Yikes.

One theologian once quipped that searching for Jesus is like looking down a well, and at the bottom we just see a mirror image of ourselves. I think that's true, at least it is for me. We've all got an image of who we think Jesus is, and that Jesus often just so happens to have voted for who we voted for, thinks about the world the way we think of it, and approves of our life choices.

Let me put it this way. If you're reading the gospels and you don't feel offended by Jesus at some point, then you're not really reading them. Nowhere is the challenge of Christian discipleship, the impossible tension of grace and obedience, more laid bare than in "The Sermon on the Mount"—the teachings of Jesus found in Matthew 5-7.

This fall we're getting back to the basics. We're inviting you to ask the most important question we can ask, "What would Jesus do?" When we see what Jesus does, we begin to know who he is. And since we are his body, it's only when we see what he does that we know who we are.

As it turns out, the gospel's recipe yields quite a meal—bread and wine for the whole world. So, come this fall and be challenged by the good news of Jesus Christ. Without this news, nothing else matters.

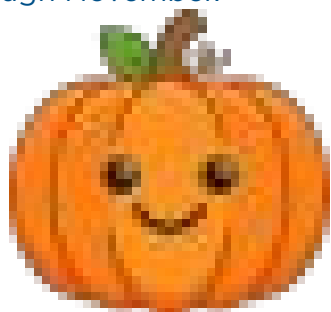

What Does God Think?



There's this great scene in Wendell Berry's novel "Jaybor Crow." A young student's mind is full of questions. Where did this world come from? Why do I exist? What does God look like? Each day, his professor hears and expects his urgent knock on the door. For some of the questions, there are answers. But upon one visit, the professor offers a thought that hasn't left me since I read it. "Some questions are too big. Some questions, you must live."

It's hard to live questions with ChatGPT in your pocket. But I suppose this kind of earnest questioning, this yearning for understanding, is, in part, what Youth ministry is for. And so, this year we're going to be tackling some profound and yet practical questions.

In confirmation, we'll lift the heaviest questions Christianity has to offer. Who is God? Who are we? What is the Bible for? How do I read it? At youth group, we'll be diving down to the ground floor of our young people's existence. Each youth group, I will raise a practical question and attempt to offer thoughts from both Scripture and theology. Here are a few examples: How do I figure out what to do with my life? What do I do when I'm anxious and depressed? Why do bad things happen to good people? What does God think about AI? My grandma died last year, where is she right now? My parents make me come to church, but I think it's boring-why does it even matter? Lots of my friends drink, sometimes I do, too. What's the big deal?

As far as the youth: Porch B-stud continues on Wednesdays at 7:30pm through fall at 117 Maupin Ave. Youth Group is on Sundays, 5-6:30pm, at First Pres.

Finally, at the risk of putting too fine a point on it, I'd like to make an elevator pitch for why kids should participate in Youth activities:

1. Studies show that kids who participate in youth activities struggle less with depression, anxiety, and loneliness. Even if your child isn't sure what they believe about God, or even if you're not sure what you believe, send them because it will make their life better.
2. All is grace: Our kids live in a world soaked in merit, performance, and reward. In school, in sports, and online, our young people receive the message that their worth is rooted in what they accomplish. Youth group is one place where they will hear the opposite. God's grace, God's forgiveness, God's life, is already and always there as a gift.
3. Mentors: Kids who grow up with other adults mentoring and loving them live more robust lives. That can and does happen at school and in sports—all to the good. Let the youth group be another one of those places. Let me (Pastor Josh) and our other youth leaders care about and love your kids.
4. What life is really about: At youth group, we talk about ultimate things. What is life really about? What is it really for? We have lots of fun, but we also dive into those questions, too.

We hope ALL youth and their friends will have an active part in our youth programming this fall!

Keeping Promises

“Do you promise to pray for this child, to help their parents in raising them into faith in Jesus Christ? Will you be the church to them, with them, and for them as they grow?”

This is the promise you make as a congregation every time we baptize a child. There was a day when this promise was made for you. It is a binding, loving, eternal promise. In a world of broken promises, baptismal promise is one of the most sacred promises that we keep.

This promise is rooted in the story of Scripture, a book of God's promises in Jesus Christ. What does God promise you in Scripture? God promises to give you a future when you're stuck in your past. God promises that one day all tears, hardship, brokenness and death will be wiped away as if they never were. God promises the presence of the Holy Spirit, the advocate and comforter who sticks with the church through thick and thin.

Not long ago we celebrated First Presbyterian's 200th anniversary—we are a church built upon the foundation two centuries of promise-keeping. Every Youth Sunday I ponder these promises as we see what God and you have done in forming children into mature people in Christ.

Ultimately, we are the sum of the promises kept for us, and the promises we make to others. That's why this year your GIVE ministry team is changing things up a bit. This year, we are throwing out the idea of “pledge.” Pledges are important enough, but they do not get to the heart of the matter. The heart of the matter, well, is the heart. The heart is the source of our promises. So, this year, rather than making pledges, we will make promises.

What do our promises of giving do? They offer us the chance to partner with God in ministry. Everything you see inside and outside these walls, our beautiful worship, our compelling preaching, our love of children, our service toward others, our tutoring at Overton, the transformation of lives, baptisms, funerals, and weddings...the whole scope of life in faith that God gifts us in ministry—all of this is only possible because of the promises you make.



If I can be candid for a moment, there has never been a year as your pastors that Lara and I have not raised our financial promise. We do so because that's what leaders do. But we also do so because there's not been a year we have not been moved to tears at the promises this church fulfills in Christ. Those very promises you have made to countless children and you made to our children (Phoebe and Joanna). What can we do but respond to these promises with our own promise of abundance?

What will God do with our promises this fall? More than we can imagine. So begin now. Begin asking yourself and God, “What promise am I ready to make?” I promise it will make a difference in this church and in this world.

Pastor's Pick from Pastor Lara

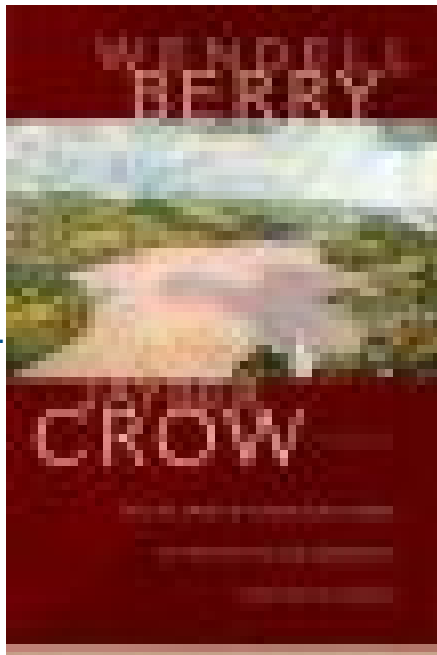


Nonfiction and inspirational books help us grow by providing practical, real-world tools for self and community improvement, fostering deep emotional resilience through true stories, thought-provoking authors, and boosting cognitive focus. These books offer actionable insights—covering psychology, philosophy, and memoirs—that help us rewire thought processes, boost motivation, and build better habits, including reading for growth and a deeper awareness of ourselves, our neighbors, and our world. For this fall, Pastor Lara gives us three more good picks!!

Jayber Crow by Wendell Berry

Whenever I'm asked, "What would you be if you weren't a pastor?" I say, without hesitation, a hairdresser. I get to listen to people gab and make them feel dignified and beautiful. With the novel, *Jayber Crow*, you get to be transported to mid-20th-century Kentucky as you read the fictional memoir of a Port Williams resident, a permanent bachelor and barber. Jayber tells not only his own story but the stories of the folks who gab in his chair. Even more, he tells the story of a changing 20th-century America from the farm to the machine. My favorite Jayber's reflections are of faith, prayer, and love.

At first, I thought his book was slow, but I realized that it's not the sort of book you consume so much as a book that happens to you. By the end, you find yourself, quite like Jayber, changed by God's grace.



Theo of Golden by Allen Levi

I picked up *Theo of Golden* this winter when y'all couldn't stop telling me about it! If you haven't read it yet, it's a fabulous book set in quaint small-town Georgia. I pictured downtown Pawleys Island in my mind. The mysterious Theo arrives in Golden to impart

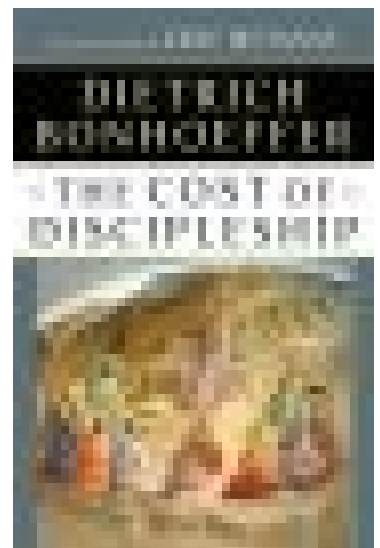
not only the gift of hand-drawn portraits of locals but even more the gift of attention and grace to his recipients. Theo embodies the call to ministry in the last third of life. He takes time to notice other people and encourage them. His simple act of attention transforms all who receive it.



Cost of the Discipleship by Dietrich Bonhoeffer

"The call of discipleship is a call to die," says Dietrich Bonhoeffer. You can believe him; following Jesus cost Bonhoeffer his life. This most famous of Bonhoeffer's works studies the Sermon on the Mount and explores what it means for our daily discipleship as Christians. I read this book in college and recently picked it back up in preparation for our WWJD? series this fall. Wow, this is a stunning invitation to simple obedience, profound faith, costly discipleship, and abundant grace. There is no better companion to our WWJD Sermon Series this fall. Come, Christian brothers and sisters, let's follow Christ together.

The Life Center Worship Team is one of many small groups at First Presbyterian. The fellowship we share during Thursday rehearsals and Sunday mornings extends beyond the music. We pray for one another and for our church family. We also take pride in mentoring the college scholars on our team and supporting one another in concerts, theater, and other outside activities. The LCW Team rehearses on Thursday nights at 6:30 and again on Sunday mornings at 7:30 before the LCW service.

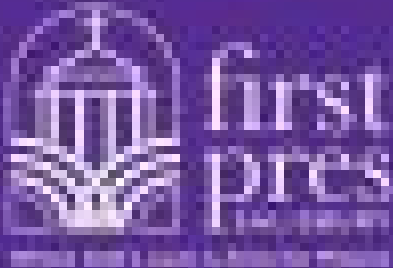

NOW FOR FIRST PARENTS...

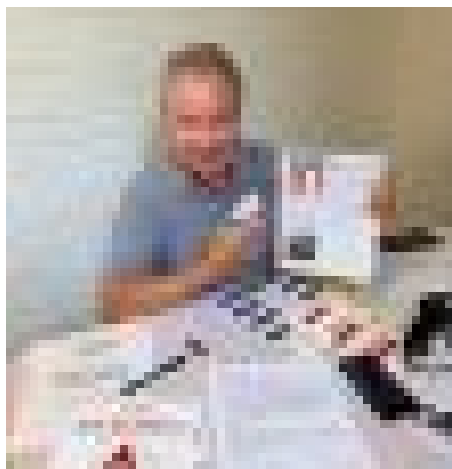

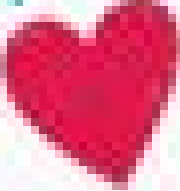
